Lieutenant Charles Hull Sewall, (S), USNR, was born 5 Sept. 1913, at Great Barrington, Mass., and graduated from Noble and Greenough School in Dedham, Mass., in 1931. He then attended Dartmouth from which he graduated in 1935 with an A.B. degree.

From 1 July 1935 until August 1942, he worked for Bird and Son Inc., at East Walpole, Mass. During this time he performed sales work, sales promotion work, and was Office Manager for a Division of the Paper Products Department.

Lieutenant Sewall entered the Navy on 26 Aug. 1942, and was immediately assigned to the Naval Aviation Cadet Selection Board, Kansas City, Mo., until 15 Oct. 1942. However, on 29 Aug. 1942, he was loaned to the Naval Air Base at Fairfax Field, Kansas City, Kansas. He received permanent orders to Fairfax Field on 15 Oct. 1942, and moved to Naval Air Station, Olathe, Kansas, upon the opening of the field there. At Fairfax and Olathe he was Aide to the Commanding Officer, but in the absence of an Executive Officer performed many of his duties.

On 11 April 1943, he was assigned to Naval Air Station, Norman, Oklahoma, at which station he was Assistant O.O.D. On 6 Sept. 1943, he was sent to N.A.A.F., Shawnee, on temporary duty as Provost Marshal and B.O.C. Officer.

Lieutenant Sewall reported to ComFair West Coast on 22 Jan. 1944, and was assigned for a month to CASU-5, until assigned on 21 Feb. 1944 to CASU-44.

Lieutenant Sewall, as Operations Officer, has continually faced unusually difficult problems. While the responsibility of furnishing gasoline is not a CASU duty, in order to assure that schedules were maintained, he has consistently shown initiative, perseverance and drive in order to accomplish his job, and in many instances other peoples' jobs as well. Likewise, in handling, taxiing and parking of planes, the work was performed in an outstanding fashion. As Public Relations Officer and Historian, he has further made a real contribution to the success of the unit.
