My dear Mr. & Mrs. Nauman:

It was with deepest regret that I found it necessary to inform the Navy Department that your son was missing in action. He was on temporary duty with a squadron, and the meagre details as we know them indicate that the aircraft of which he was a crewmember was attacked by enemy fighters and lost. We have no proof, since there were no survivors.

On the morning of 11 October 1944, your son departed this base on a routine search. The aircraft failed to return, and from a brief radio transmission we know that it was attacked by enemy fighters. The next morning two crews were sent to search for the missing aircraft. These two aircraft were attacked by enemy fighters in approximately the same location we suspect your son was, and the squadron had some satisfaction in destroying six out of the eight attacking fighters without loss. However, no trace of the missing crew was found.

Your son was doing an outstanding job, both in the maintenanes of aircraft, and more recently with his crewmated in many commendable missions against our enemy. His absence is felt by the CASU and the squadron most grievously. We all join in extending to you our heartfelt sympathy in this period of great uncertainty.
